From the President

Greetings ADXA Folks – Let's talk about pets.

Most folks, if not everyone, love pets. They have become as much a part of our families as our kids or siblings. We care about them, spend time with them as well as a lot of money on them. Pets come in different varieties, cats and dogs are the most popular although these days we see a number of "unique" pets floating around.

My favorite pet is a peeve.....that's right, a pet peeve!! C'mon Harrison, that's not a pet! OK, then why do we refer to a peeve as a "pet"? A pet peeve is simply something that is personally annoying or a personal dislike of which we frequently complain; a particular personal vexation.

My pet peeves haven't really changed over the years but as I grow older, I have more courage to express them. Most of you know outside of work and family my passion, my only passion, is amateur radio. I don't golf, watch TV, or much of anything else. Radio is my life long love (Kim even acknowledges that!) so I naturally have a few pet peeves about things in ham radio. The most concerning is the seriously deficient technical knowledge of radio amateurs today but that is something that can be overcome. The real root of the issue is most today have absolutely NO desire to learn anything beyond memorizing some questions to pass an exam. Emergency preparedness and emergency communications have always been one of the primary components of the Amateur Radio Service and should always be. What occurred several years ago, though, is the focus changed to getting folks licensed as "operators" and developing and maturing technical knowledge took a back seat......if it was even in the car to start with!

"Where you going with this, Harrison?" is the question I always pose (and you always ask) after an opening to my writings. Well, once again it is simple and applies to one of the missions of ADXA in providing opportunities for you to increase your technical knowledge and skill to improve your station and be at the top of your game in the pileups when that new one is on the air.

If you refer back to the third paragraph of this writing, I noted my pet peeve is not on the lack of technical knowledge and skill of hams but rather the lack of desire to learn. When I go to a hamfest I like to attend the technical forums that are offered. There is always something I can learn regardless of what I already know (or don't know!!). The rooms are usually packed with folks who have a desire to learn but the hamfest is flooded with a greater number who care nothing about that. They only care about whether they can find a better deal on a \$15 Baofeng radio out of China that doesn't meet the FCC regulatory requirements for signal purity, and they don't care that it doesn't! The extent of their technical knowledge is to go home, pull out a Visa card, and buy some time on a remote station to work DX then brag about their "accomplishments"!

Now, we can argue all night and into the next day, and most likely into the next night, whether that was the result of the elimination of the Morse requirement for licensing but it wasn't. I would offer that most folks who obtained an amateur radio license in the last 20 years couldn't pick a 470 ohm resistor out of a police lineup if their life depended on it and that's not a result of not knowing Morse! Should they possess basic electricity and electronics knowledge? Maybe not but they should at least have the desire to learn and that's the whole point of my writing (grumbling?). YOU are BETTER than that. WE are BETTER

than that. We are DX'ers, the top of the class in amateur radio. You were sponsored and accepted to be a member of this association, one of the oldest and most respected DX associations in the USA....heck, in the WORLD, and it is exciting to see the desire that each of you have to learn more than you now know about the technical side of amateur radio.

We're definitely NOT from the government, but we, ADXA, are here to help. We're not going to "spoon feed" you but do whatever we can do to provide each of you with the resources to improve your knowledge to build a better station or improve the one you have. To improve your knowledge base of operating skill to enable you to get in that pileup and walk over the east coast when working Europe and trample those W6 weenies for that south pacific rare one you need. One of the most informative technical presentations that generated several questions and comments this past year came during our annual conference when Roger, N5QS, and Dennis, W5DM, presented "Towers & Concrete". Even I learned a few things !!!

The March meeting program is on 6-meter EME. You may wonder why the heck that is applicable. DXCC countries confirmed on 6-meters is included in the DXCC Challenge numbers. Many of you have, or are working toward, a 6-meter DXCC. Most DXpeditions today include 6-meter EME in their station line up and it's not that difficult if you have at least a 7 element Yagi and can run 500 watts or more. Specific "technical" details March 2!

At a future meeting we want to line up ADXA member Mark Graves, K5OO, to talk to us about power line noise. Mark works professionally in the engineering department of a power distribution cooperative and tracking down noise is one of his responsibilities. There are so many noise sources that plague amateur radio today and our first claim is it is power line noise. Quite frequently that is not the source and is often tracked down right inside the individual's own home! We want to provide you with the knowledge, information, and tools to assess your own situation to allow you to develop a great working relationship with your power company when line noise issues do develop so you can resolve them quickly.

As always, thank you for your support of ADXA and for taking the time to read this rambling. Now, get back in the shack and "GET IN THERE AND WORK 'EM!!"

The Term "DXpedition"


We all know what it means.... "One or more operators activating a rare or semi-rare entity on the bands".... but where did the term originate?

One can certainly surmise that the term is an off-shoot of the term "Expedition - a journey or excursion undertaken for a specific purpose."

This leads us to the 1948 VP7NG operation - the Expedition "Gon Waki" by Bob, W9NWX; Buddy, W3GRP; and Charlie, W4NND. This was one of the first post-war operations in the Bahamas - especially done for the 1948 ARRL DX Contest and considered the first modern "DXpedition." Great transmitter, receivers and antenna! And note the honest signal report given to W3LOE.

Many attribute this operation as the beginning of the use of the term "DXpedition." It's a great story of amateur radio history.

You might recognize the name Bob Dennison (W9NWX)... he later became W0DX/VP2VI and was President of both the ARRL (1966-1972) and IARU. After heading up the VP7NG trip during the 1948 ARRL DX Contest, Bob was credited with being the "father of the modern DXpedition." His other firsts include Clipperton (1954 - FO8AJ) and Malpelo (1961 - HK0TU).


